## Sustainable Funding

2022 - 2023 was a record-breaking year for the Grants Team here at CVSC, seeing us invest more than £2million into our communities. We are proud to have the largest, most dynamic grants programmes of any CVC in North Wales.

During this reporting period, CVSC managed 7 different grant schemes including Rhyl Flats Windfarm Community Fund, Clocaenog Forest Windfarm Fund, Gwynt y Môr Community Fund, Comic Relief, Youth Led Grants, Voluntary Services Emergency & Recovery Fund and the Regional Integration Fund (RIF).

## Sustainable Funding Case Study - Canolfan Addysg Bro Aled

The Canolfan Addysg Bro Aled Management Committee was established when the Centre was opened in 1967, to organise and run the community elements of the Centre.

The challenge was to try to meet the requirements of the different associations using the Centre. The Nursery School needed more space and wanted to avoid clearing all their materials after each session, and so it was decided to extend a room and fit suitable facilities for nursery children and to create a room of considerable size for the use of the community and the Nursery School.

As it was a fairly large project, the permission of the County Council had to be obtained, and the development was planned in the following 2 parts:

- Part 1 was to adapt the room by installing toilets suitable for small children and opening an entrance leading directly to the outside play area.
- Part 2 was to build a new extension to the room.

The work was completed in just over a year through the cooperation of local organisations and the support of substantial grants.

The new resource has created a huge impression and impact for all users and has created a Centre that we can be proud of, in what it offers to the community of Bro Aled and further afield.

Support was received from The National Community Lottery Fund's Awards for All programme, Brenig Wind Farm Fund, Glyn Owen Fund and their own reserves for part 1 and nearly £60,000 through CVSC from the Clocaenog Forest Wind Farm Fund for part 2 along with £9,000 in match funding from the Bro Aled Community Council, Glyn Owen Fund and

their own reserves.

The support was secured by picking up the phone and discussing our intention to submit an application with the grant officers, before submitting an application for consideration. This saved a lot of time and there was guidance and support provided from those who administer the grants.

Alwyn Williams, member of the Management Committee states "Without the support of CVSC we could not have completed our project. Their experience in the field is extremely important and taking advantage of their expertise and support really facilitates the work. The Grants Officer is in every case to be praised for sharing our vision and ensuring success.

Being part of the team that was responsible for this exciting development in Bro Aled has been a privilege and seeing the reinforcement of the community spirit in the area has given us hope for the future."

## Community Support Hub


CVSC's Community Support Hub had an exceptionally busy year, assisting the county's residents in accessing information, guidance and practical support for their issues. Demand for the service was unprecedented, particularly when presented with the cost-of-living crisis that many of us faced.

In the true spirit of the Third Sector, it was heartwarming to see organsiations of all sizes step forward to provide their expertise and their services for the benefit of the area, sometimes being the difference between a child going to bed hungry or not.

For all that you do, CVSC salutes you!

Through simple marketing and innovative use of its website, the Community Support Hub developed a far-reaching approach to assisting residents, which saw our support reaching out much further than we anticipated; our statistics show that a significant number of individuals were accessing our information portal from throughout the UK. This, combined with physically touring the Hub throughout the county has been instrumental in promoting its services and its value to local communities.

Statistics tell a story and ours are no different. During the course of the year, 2,218 individuals accessed information, guidance and practical support from the Community Support Hub, with 5,816 interventions being offered or sought.



## Volunteering

Volunteering is a powerful force, an embodiment of compassion and selflessness that unites people from all walks of life in the pursuit of positive change. Volunteers dedicate their time, skills, and passion to address pressing issues, support the vulnerable, and nurture a sense of community.

On June 6th, we all got together at the Trinity Centre in Llandudno for our annual Volunteer Celebratory event, and it was an absolute blast! The evening unfolded as a heart-warming tribute to the diverse tapestry of volunteering activities taking place within our community. It was a rare opportunity to meet and recognise individuals who are making a significant difference in the lives of others.

In the stories shared and the smiles exchanged, we found inspiration and a reminder of the boundless compassion that resides within our volunteers. They are the backbone of positive change, and through events like these, we aim to shine a spotlight on their remarkable efforts and inspire others to join in creating a brighter future for our community.

We were joined by the High Sheriff of Clwyd, Kate Hill-Trevor who presented the High Sheriff Award to our Youth Led Panel members.

## Case Study - CVSC Volunteering Centre helping individuals to find perfect opportunities

Carole's journey began when she approached Kasia from the CVSC Volunteering Team during the 25th Anniversary Event, driven by her desire to contribute to the community. After few initial bumps on the road, Kasia connected her with a wonderful team at Clwb yr Efail, Pam and Terry. Carol fitted right in and was delighted with how welcoming they made her feel, showing her around and making sure she felt confident with all her tasks. She quickly became a valued member of the team!

As a Volunteer at the Day Centre for the Elderly, Carol serves lunches, assists with seating, and caters to the needs of members. Volunteering has made a big difference to Carol, it brought her happiness and sense of purpose. Carol is now mixing with people, and she enjoys their company as she aims to spread joy among the club's attendees.

Terry from Clwb yr Efail cannot praise Carol enough: "Carol is an invaluable asset, does a great deal to help keeps things running smoothly at the club."

Kasia emphasises: "Carol's story proves that even if the first step doesn't work out, you should not get discouraged. CVSC is there to help individuals find fulfilling roles, that suit their circumstances and motivations."

## Engagement & Influencing

Our Engagement and Influencing work have continued strongly this year, with direct work on behalf of the local authority, Conwy County Borough Council with Looked after children and children and young people with disabilities through various events and groups, including their Louder Voices group.

We also carried out consultation and engagement work on behalf of Welsh Government on the new Child Poverty Strategy running a number of events across the county to collect the experiences of parents and carers.

Our attendance at a Place Plan Kickstarter event with Planning Aid Wales and four towns in Conwy who were undertaking their Place Plans - Conwy, Llanrwst, Llanfairfechan & Penmaenmawr ensured that information about the sector was fed into mapping exercises.

Work also continued with engaging and influencing the health sector, with participation at weekly Community Resource Teams meetings, work on the Accelerated Cluster Development, as well as hosting a quarterly Health & Social Care network and attending special interest groups around Dementia, Older People and Autism as well as feeding into the Healthy Weight Healthy Wales programme.



### Governance

Support and guidance for community groups and organisations to meet good practice, remain key priorities for the CVSC Team. This was demonstrated by the need for groups to consider and reflect on their growth and development after a difficult few years. Increased recognition of potential responsibilities, alongside the need for funding, has meant a general move towards more robust governing documents and incorporation.

Parallel to this, has been the ongoing need to continue to keep everyone safe, with the newfound focus triggered by the introduction of the new national Wales Safeguarding Learning, Training, and Development Standards. Promotion and key events included 2 multi agency Safeguarding Roadshows.



CVSC hosted 2 full day events in person, along with colleagues from CCBC, DBS and WCVA, to raise awareness of the new national Safeguarding Learning, Training and Development Standards.

Awareness of these standards:

- gave assurance to organisations that all practitioners and volunteers had the same level of learning and development when moving from one organisation to another in Wales
- improved multi-agency learning and development
- provided a common language and encourages organisations and practitioners to work together




